AGENDA ITEM NO. 1: Call to Order

James Bronikowski called the meeting to order at 1:08PM. A roll call of the planning group members was taken to record attendance and a quorum was established prior to calling the meeting to order.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 2: Welcome, Meeting Facilitation Information and Instructions

James Bronikowski and Director Brooke Paup welcomed members to the meeting. James Bronikowski provided meeting facilitation information and instructions.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 3: Member Introductions

Each present voting and non-voting member of the Region 2 Lower Red-Sulphur-Cypress RFPG introduced themselves.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 4: Regional Flood Planning Overview Presentation

James Bronikowski presented an overview of the regional flood planning process.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 5: Discussion of group bylaws and consider adopting group bylaws

James Bronikowski presented the model bylaws provided by the TWDB for the RFPG to consider adopting and opened discussion on adopting group bylaws.

After discussion, the bylaws were edited to replace "Model RFPG" with "Region 2 Lower Red-Sulphur-Cypress RFPG". Additionally, the members discussed and made edits to the model bylaws regarding the following topics: maximum number of voting members, removal of nonapplicable language regarding neighboring RFPGs touching the Gulf Coast, designation of alternates, selection of initial officers, calling special meetings, amendment of bylaws, and officer vacancies.

The members discussed expiration of terms, designation of alternates in writing, selection of Executive Committee members, quorum requirements, and special meetings in regard to Open Meetings Act requirements. No changes were made regarding these topics.

A motion was made by Greg Carter to adopt the bylaws.

The motion was seconded by Joseph Weir.

The vote to adopt the group bylaws passed by a vote of 9 Ayes and 0 Nays.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 6: Consider nominating and electing regional flood planning group Chair or Interim Chair

James Bronikowski described the Chair/Interim Chair election process and opened the floor to nominations for the Chair or Interim Chair position.

The members discussed the possibility of selecting an Interim Chair.

A nomination of Reeves Hayter as the Interim Chair was made by Joseph Weir.

The nomination of Reeves Hayter as the Interim Chair was approved by unanimous consent.

James Bronikowski offered for Interim Chair Reeves Hayter to facilitate the remainder of meeting. Interim Chair Reeves Hayter requested that James Bronikowski continue facilitating the meeting.






Figure 1-2. Riverine Watershed and Floodplain

A general and temporary condition of partial or complete inundation of normally dry land area from overflow of inland or tidal waters or from the unusual and rapid accumulation or runoff of surface waters from any source.

The area of land subject to periodic inundation by floodwaters.



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Flooding 101: Benefits of Floods

When floodplains are preserved in their natural state, they provide many benefits:

- Reduce severity of floods by storing floodwaters, reducing flood velocities, and curbing sedimentation and erosion
- Contribute to groundwater recharge
- Provide recreation and quality of life
- Create habitats for many plants and animals.



Flooding 101: Quantifying Flood Events

- 1.0% annual chance flood event
 - flood event having a 1.0% chance of happening in any given year = every year
 - also referred to as the "base flood" or "100-year flood"
- 0.2% annual chance flood event
 - flood event having a 0.2% chance of happening in any given year
 - also referred to as the "500-year flood"











• A proposed project (structural and non-structural) that when implemented will reduce flood risk, mitigate flood hazards to life or property.







- Meeting preparations, notices, agendas, materials, minutes, presentations, and public comments
- Website creation and maintenance
- Intraregional and interregional coordination and communication to develop the regional flood plan.

ITEM 8:

Consider revision of Group Bylaws

BACKGROUND:

The RFPG Bylaws were reviewed and adopted at the meeting on Oct. 30, 2020. In our first meeting, the membership wanted to fill all voting positions and have a chance to get to know one another before making any officer or executive committee selections. The following would allow additional time for Officer and Executive Committee selection.

TWDB has also suggested a revision for clarification of Officer and Exe. Committee appointments.

DISCUSSION:

Article VIII. 2(a) - Initial Officers. Within 90180 days after the adoption of these bylaws, the voting members shall select initial officers. (This would allow until April 28, 2021)

Article VIII. 2(b) - **Regular Officers.** Beginning in 2022 Rregular officers shall be selected at the first meeting of each calendar year after the calendar year in which these bylaws were adopted.

Article V. 4.1 and 4.2 – Filing Vacancies – 4.1 outlines the process of filling a voting position should that position be vacated. This includes the requirement for the Executive Committee to review the nominations and make recommendations to the Group.

The end of 4.2 states the following:

If upon the designation of initial flood planning group members by the TWDB on October 1, 2020, there is a vacant voting position for one or more of the required interest categories in 31 TAC §361.11(e), the Region 2 Lower Red-Sulphur-Cypress RFPG shall solicit nominations by generally utilizing the selection process set forth in this section, A nominee may be selected to fill the vacant voting position upon a majority vote of the voting members present.

RECOMMENDATION:

Consider redline revisions for Article VIII

Evaluate weather Article V. 4.2 allows for the appointment of vacant positions by the voting members without recommendations from an Executive Committee.

ITEM 9:

Consider applications of nominees to fill the currently vacant *Counties, Flood Districts,* and *Industries* voting positions

BACKGROUND:

In the meeting on October 30, 2020, the RFPG authorized initiate the solicitation process for individuals to fill the vacant required voting member positions not designated by the TWDB. The positions are *Counties*, *Flood Districts*, and *Industries*.

DISCUSSION:

ATCOG worked with Chairman Hayter and the TWDB to post the following solicitation: https://www.twdb.texas.gov/flood/planning/doc/Region%202 Vacancy%20Notice.pdf?d = 13600.744999945164

All nominations are due by January 4, 2021. The above notice was posted on the TWDB on their website under "Flood Planning" at www.TexasFlood.org, and delivered to each of the 20 County Clerks as required by the bylaws.

RECOMMENDATION:

Each nomination will be forwarded to our voting members after the close of the nomination period. We ask each voting member review the nominations prior to our January 7th meeting and be prepared to discuss qualifications and consider member acceptance as directed by the Group Bylaws as considered in Item 8.

ITEM 10:

Consider adding voting members, non-voting members, and/or new interest categories

BACKGROUND:

In the October 30th meeting, members discussed the potential addition of members for federal representation.

DISCUSSION:

Article V Section 4.2, and Article VI Section 2 addresses the ability to add these positions.

RECOMMENDATION:

Consider additional representation that the RFPG considers appropriate for development of its Regional Flood Plan.

<u>ITEM 11:</u>

Consider a means by which the RFPG will develop and host a public website (required per §361.21(b).

BACKGROUND:

Texas Administrative Code §361.21(b) states:

Each RFPG shall create and maintain a website that they will use to post public notices of all its full RFPG, subgroup, and subcommittee meetings and make available meeting agendas and related meeting materials for the public, in accordance with the items listed below in subsection (h)(1) - (3) of this section.

DISCUSSION:

ATCOG is accustom to maintaining this type of site and information. We will establish a website that meets/exceeds the requirements of the rule. Costs will be minimal and maintained internally by ATCOG IT staff. The site will be easy to edit and improve as more information is needed to be added.

ITEM 12:

Each RFPG shall provide a means by which it will accept written public Comment prior to and after meetings. The RFPGs must also allow oral public Comment during RFPG meetings.
